

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. The <u>Education Inspection Framework</u> (Ofsted 2019 p64) makes clear there will be a focus on 'whether leaders and those responsible for governors all understand their respective roles and perform these in a way that enhances the effectiveness of the school'.

Under the <u>Quality of Education criteria</u> (p41) inspectors consider the extent to which schools can articulate their curriculum (INTENT), construct their curriculum (IMPLEMENTATION) and demonstrate the outcomes which result (IMPACT).

We had a new track installed in September, so many classes have made the most of using this for additional opportunities for physical activity. Due to staggered break times and a restriction on space, more classes have made use of online resources such as 'Just Dance' and 'Koo Koo Kangeroo' to enable them to brain breaks and exercise in their classrooms. As a school we hosted a socially distanced Cross Country event for





other local Primary Schools – Overton finished first place in this event.
